This was a very good start to this year 8 group. They were not the youngest year group and had settled well into High School routines.


The group were involved in many sporting endeavours such as Rugby Union, Rugby League (Buckley Shield), swimming and athletics, achieving excellent results for the school.


Students also performed well in the academic level and many were awarded certificates for their high level of achievement.




Year 7 Report

The year 2009 was filled with many exciting excursions and events in the Science faulty. Many students had the opportunity to extend their learning in the classroom with visits to museums, zoos, research facilities and challenge days. The Science faculty implemented new programs and assessment tasks with all junior years completing practical tests, assignments and examinations to gain their results. Staff changes include Ms Tegan Goolmere working in Term 1 and 4, Mr Ronald Marquardt in Term 2, 3 and 4 and Mrs Jennifer Conway starting as the new Head Teacher.

Our First big Science trip occurred at the beginning of Term2, before school started back Mr Baker, Mr Cook, Mr Smith and Ms Spear headed to Sydney with Year 12 students from Biology, Chemistry, Physics and Senior Science. This trip allowed our students to experience learning experiences which improved their understanding of key concepts in their courses. Highlights included the 'Shipwrecks and Salvage' workshop at the Maritime museum for Chemistry, a visit to the Lucas Heights Nuclear facility to gain understanding of the uses of radioactivity, being grossed out and amazed at the Museum of Disease at the University of NSW, experience the forces on the body while on amusement rides at Lunar Park. Students gained valuable life lessons in using public transport in Sydney, staying in youth hostels and coping in the big smoke.

In Term 2, a bus load of students from the top Year 9 and 10 Science classes headed to Kempsey to compete in the Science and Engineering Challenge. Students gained valuable skills in working in teams, problem solving and finding practical solutions to problems. Students found the day challenging and rewarding and although we did not win the day we left with valuable skills and a new appreciation of the value of working together to achieve great results.

Year 11 Biology planned three trips to Way Way creek in Term 1 however each trip was cancelled as the rain started and continued to fall and the area was flooded. We eventually managed a trip in Term 2 to the Coffs Harbour botanical gardens to view our unique Australian plants, animals and fossils with presentations from the Australian museum and Taronga Zoo.

Year 7 had a great start to the learning of Science at high school. Students impressed us with their developing skills in planning and conducting investigations and their commitment to home study with amazing poster assignments decorating all our laboratories. At the end of Term 2 we issued invitations to our first Year 7 Zoosnooze to Taronga Zoo who had impressed their teachers with a great attitude to learning and good behaviour in all classes. This coincided with the birth of the first Baby Asian Elephant so the excitement of the trip increased.

In early September, Mr Baker, Mrs Conway, Ms Spear, Mr Hall and Ms Bankier boarded the train to Sydney with 50 excited Year 7 students. The train trip was long but students used it as an opportunity to socialize with friends, challenge Mr Baker at chess and eat lots. We then had to navigate from Central to Circular Quay by train and then board a ferry to the zoo. Students learnt to be responsible for their own stuff and the hustle and bustle of city life. Our night at the zoo was fantastic with hands on talks about various animals and viewing the zoo at night including the big cats, tiger, lions and snow leopards. Our sleeping quarters were also inhabited by various creatures including sugar gliders, lizards, snakes, crocodiles and frogs. Our day at the zoo was fantastic, all students were given the opportunity to hand feed a giraffe a carrot, we saw the baby elephant and lots of other animals. The purchase of an Embellishing machine has furthered the creative juices of some students and will increase in use over the year. This machine felts fabrics and yarns together using barbed needles and is very quick and easy to use with spectacular results.

Child Studies



The students in Year 7 have worked most enthusiastically in all areas of Technology. They learned to lay up material and patterns and then to cut out a very practical apron. They chose their own colours, most opting to use a contrasting colour on their pocket. Apart from learning how to use the sewing machines they also designed their own logo using computer software in Microsoft Publisher. These were then printed onto special material which was then ironed and sewn onto their apron. The students also mastered ironing skills which will definitely be useful in the future!



Practical food preparation has been one of the most "satisfying" Technology subjects for many of the students. They have learned to interpret recipes and to follow them accurately to produce sumptuous food items. Measuring and collecting ingredients, cleaning work areas and working as a team member in the kitchen are additional skills the students have achieved. They are aware of what constitutes a healthy diet and are able to suggest healthy foods.



Many students already had computing skills when they began Year 7 this year, however, with greater emphasis on developing their skills the students have been able to photograph food items made in class and then format these into a calendar for 2010. The results have been a practical and useful product.

Particular attention was paid to Theatre in Education principles and ways of engaging the audience. Each performer and group had to design their own makeup and costume design and develop an original piece. Sport Report!

2009 has been an absolutely stellar year for sport at MHS. We have had many students excel at National, State and North Coast level, and have seen a number of our teams reach state and regional semi finals.

Djaran Smith has stamped his mark at this point in the year as the top sporting achiever at MHS. Djaran represented MHS at the National Swimming Championships in Perth and won silver in the 17yrs 200m IM,100m fly (also going under the national record mark), and bronze in the 17yrs 50m & 100m breaststroke, 50 fly, as well as a silver in two relay events, and bronze in a third relay event. Sharni Tape was also a NSW representative at this carnival and picked up a silver medal in the 15yrs 100 free, bronze in the 50 free, and 3 silvers and a bronze medal in relay events.

Our State champions are plentiful, and are represented across all three sports of swimming, cross country and athletics. In the pool, the 15 girls relay team are CHS champions and now also hold the record time. This team consisted of Tamara Gallop, Jessica Howe, Alina Tape and Sharni Tape. Across at the cross country course, our 18 Girls team are also CHS champions. This team consisted of Ellie Fuller, Jessica Langham, Tulsa Daley and Renae Power. Ellie also qualified for the NSW team at these championships and went on to win a silver team medal at the national titles at Nowra. Finally, at the recent State athletics carnival, Clare Maloney(17 triple jump), John Rowe (16 Triple jump) and Alina Tape (12 800m), all came home as CHS champions in their events.



Many other students participated at these three carnivals and the other medals won were:Swimming – Djaran Smith – 2 medals, Sharni tape – 2 medals, Jessica Howe –medal, Alina tape – medal, 17 Boys relay (Joel Brunsdon, Ben Mulvihill, Marcus Castillo-Peltonen, Djaran Smith – bronze . Our swimmers reached 17 finals at this carnival.

Cross Country – Alina Tape picked up a bronze All Schools medal, narrowly missing gold. Athletics – Clare Maloney – silver in high jump. Our athletes also made 8 finals, and our two 17 relays also made the finals.
