MHS CAPTAINS LAY A WREATH ON REMEMBANCE DAY

The 2010 Macksville Remembrance Day Service, was held under a raining sky this year. This in no way dimmed the spirits or dampened the pride of the members of the Macksville RSL Sub-Branch of Australia.

The speeches were both heartfelt and poignant and reflected the significance of the day. As quoted by Salvation Army Captain John Viles, in his speech, *"a man is the sum of his memories"*. As The Last Post bugle call sounded at 11 am precisely the small crowd who gathered, bowed their heads and remembered those who had fallen. Macksville High School's new Captains for 2011, Kyle Buckley and Caitlin Baines, did their school proud laying a beautiful wreath on behalf of the school community.



From The Principal

This week we hosted our 2011 Year 7 parents at school for an orientation. The attendance was excellent with parents coming together for the first time as a group and hearing about what our school has to offer in the way of facilities, curriculum and opportunities.

The Year Adviser, Liz O'Sullivan was introduced to the group. Liz spoke about the work she has been doing visiting our partner schools and the organisation for orientation day on the ^{7th} December. A representative from Busways attended to clear up any concerns about bus pass entitlement, applying for a pass and expectations of students while on the bus. This was followed by a tour of the school facilities. Year 8 students acted as tour guides and did an excellent job of showing the parents around and filling them in on what school life is all about at Macksville High. Thanks to the many staff who attended and helped to make the evening a success and to our P&C for providing supper.

Following the parent orientation we went straight into a P&C meeting. A small group of dedicated parents again attended and discussed a range of very important matters. Issues raised included the difficulty to find parents who are willing and have the time to volunteer. The school can-

teen is a major concern at the moment. The canteen manager reported a drop in volunteers and has requested an increase in paid staff to ensure the canteen functions effectively for the students. The result of this is a reduction in profit and likely increase in prices. The profits are managed by the P&C and used to pay for resources for the school and sponsoring of students who represent the school. I have begun investigation into how students may be able to assist and benefit from their involvement. Contact the school office if you are able to volunteer your time either on a regular basis or on a needs basis if you get a call.

Following discussion with the P&C I have purchased an online parent/teacher booking system that we hope will make the booking system easier and empower parents to be more involved. Parents will be given an access code and need to have an email address, know their child's subjects and teachers. When on line simply select subject, teacher and interview times. Your completed booking list will then be emailed to you. Parents without internet access or who need assistance will be able to phone the school for immediate assistance.

- Alcohol at parties is not easily supervised. Alcohol can easily be consumed in advance or mixed with soft drinks prior to the party. Alcohol may be left outside in cars or hidden in bushes. Although these problems can occur, they are less likely if the party is well supervised.
- Confiscate BYO alcohol from under 18's. Return it to their parents or carers.
- If guests are a mixture of under and over 18's, there is less control over the consumption of alcohol. A nominated adult should serve alcohol.
- Actively serve non-salty food throughout the party. This will slow down alcohol consumption for those who are drinking.
- Attractive non-alcoholic drinks should always be provided. For example, "Mocktails", nonalcoholic punches, soft drinks, fruit juices, coffee, tea and of course, water.
- If under 18's consume alcohol or other drugs during the party, their parents should be contacted and asked to collect them. Parents should be advised of unacceptable behaviour.
- Be firm about excluding gatecrashers. If admittance is by invitation only, gatecrashers are less likely. Prior to the party, encourage students not to broadcast party details in the school community, via the Internet or mobile phone. If gatecrashers arrive, ask them to leave
- immediately or tell them the police will be called. Parents should be present and provide active supervision throughout the party.
- If you are planning a large party, it may be a good idea to employ security guards

NSW Police have developed a range of strategies and an online Party Sign Up form which must be completed at least 72 hours before your party. Register your party at <u>www.mynite.com.au</u>. This way local Police will know that you are having a party and can offer support. Have emergency numbers handy and call police before the situation gets out of control. Advise neighbours of your party as common courtesy.
