From The Principal

It is a busy time at school. Year 12 half yearly exams commence next week, monitoring week is finalised resulting in letters going out to parents informing them of the progress their child has made so far this year and parent teacher evenings underway. We have been holding tutorial lessons for students in the Library after school on Tuesdays. Students have been taking advantage of receiving one on one support for assessment tasks and preparing for their exams. Students will be informed and information will be available in the newsletters during the year as we expand this service.

We are currently reviewing our student mobile phone policy. The executive team have developed a draft policy that will be presented to the Student Representative Council, P&C and staff for feedback and implementation as soon as possible. The purpose is to ensure current practice is aligned with policy and the school community understand their responsibilities in regard to the safe and effective use of mobile phones during school time.

It is time again when I need to ask parents to consider the colder weather and the appropriate jumpers for our students. Plain maroon for years 7 to 10 and bottle green years 11 & 12. Remember that we have available on request student assistance funds to help with the purchase of school uniform items, equipment, course fees and part excursion costs.

We have been focusing on the use by students of inappropriate language at school what is the appropriate way to speak and act. I would ask that you support us with this. It is important students understand their responsibilities in a school setting and how they speak when they are angry. On many occasions student concerns are made much more difficult to resolve due to the unacceptable language they use or by the aggressive manner in which they speak.

Next Tuesday night is our P&C Annual General Meeting. It would be great to have a large number of parents attend to hear about the P&C activities over the last 12 months and support the new committee. At the general meeting, following the AGM, as part of my report I will be presenting the mobile phone policy for feedback and reporting on National Partnership progress.

On Friday the 26th of February Macksville High competed in the Lower North Coast 15 years and under Touch Football Trials held at Bowraville. A team of both boys and girls attended the event with each squad performing at an outstanding level. The girls went through their games undefeated and finished the day as equal champions only to be unfairly eliminated due to a for and against count back. Considering many of the girls had not played this sport under competition conditions this was a huge effort and can be attributed to their enthusiasm and all-round natural ability.

The boy's team was glistening with talent and they certainly lived up to expectations, finishing outright champions. Although they started slowly with a narrow loss to arch rivals Bowraville, they soon found their rhythm and began to dismantle opposing teams with lethal precision. Every Macksville player had a taste of the try scoring feast on offer and showed great resistance to any unsportsmanlike behaviour sometimes exhibited by opponents upset at the towelling they were receiving.

Overall five Macksville players gained selection in the Lower North Coast squad, they were; Latunya Donovan, Nyomi Widders, Joe McKay, Chris Buckley and Bill Hennessey. The behaviour of the students was outstanding and a good day was had by all. Special thanks go to Mr Joyce for kindly agreeing to drive the community bus and transport everyone to and from the venue.

Macksville was undefeated for the day – winning 3 games and drawing 1. Both Macksville and West Port were named equal champions however the title of Champion went to West Port on a "for and against" countback.

AT NORTH COAST CARNIVAL - Djaran Smith named 'swimmer of the meet'! Banora Point proved to be a lucky pool for Macksville High Students. A number of students were successful in qualifying for the CHS State Swimming titles to

Djaran Smith had a wonderful day, being awarded the 'Tim Mullens Memorial Trophy' for the outstanding swimmer of the meet. Djaran, in the 17 Boys, smashed the 200IM record, slashing 5 seconds off the previous record, held by Olympian Sam Brodie. Diaran also established new records in the 100m fly and breaststroke. Djaran also had wins in the backstroke, 100 free, and 50 free.



Alina Tape also had an outstanding day winning every event she contested, and was awarded 13 girls age champion. Alina will be swimming in the 13 girls 50 free, 100 free, 200 free, 400 free, backstroke, butterfly, and 200IM.

Our 16 girls also had a successful day. Sharni Tape was named age champion after winning the 50 free, 100 free, 200 IM, butterflv, backstroke, and finishing 2nd in the 200free. Jessica Howe will also compete at Homebush after winning her breaststroke, and placing 2nd in the 200IM, and 3rd in the fly. Tamara Gallop also has earned swims with her 2nd place in the backstroke and 3rd in the breaststroke. These 3 girls, along with Alina will also contest the Medley Relay at Sydney. Beau Tape performed well in many events, and will swim at Sydney in the 15 boy's backstroke, which he won, and also the 50 free, 100 free, butterfly. Kate Shaw in the 13 Girls will also contest the 50 freestyle at State. Well done, Kate,

A number of our relays have also been successful in progressing to Sydney. The 13 girls' team swam their heart out and won by a good 20m. This team comprised of Ruby Porter, Kelly Taylor, Sophie Atkins and Kate Shaw. Along with the girls medley relay, the boys medley relay consisting of Joel Brunsdon, Ben Mulvihill, Beau Tape and Djaran Smith will also swim in Sydney after finishing 2nd. The same four boys will also contest the 17 boys relay. Our 12 girls relay narrowly missed selection, finishing 5th. This team was made up of Tori Spear, Sophie Wood. Maddi Mason and Caitlin Brown. The Knockout relay also had the best result for many years, finishing a strong second behind Kingscliff. Brad Wood and Braydan Johnson joined the other swimmers to make up this team of our twelve fastest swimmers. The Boys All Age relay also tried hard against a very strong field. Jack Ireland, Michael Fowler and Kade Spear were members of this team. We would also like to congratulate Tim Worthing on his first swim at a North Coast carnival. Sophie Atkins, Caitlin Brown, Tori Spear, Britt Atkins, Jack Ireland, Joel Brunsdon and Ben Mulvihill all swam well in their individual events and some were unlucky to just miss automatic selection for the CHS carnival.

Well done to all our swimmers, and good luck to those going onto the State titles later this term. Also at this time it would be remiss to not acknowledge the time and effort put into preparing these students by local coaches Tanya Freeman and Mark Cummings. A big thank you to both of you.

NOTICE from BUSWAYS

In recent weeks we have had a number of phone calls from enquiring parents regarding travel to and from school on our buses. There have been several issues, however the problem which concerns most including Busways, is the number of students requesting to be let off their bus at differing stops, or wanting to catch a different bus than is normal. This is usually without the knowledge of parents or school and has at times resulted in some worrying events.

Students are designated to a particular bus according to their home address. Drivers are supplied with a list of names relevant to his/her bus and a roll is marked on a daily basis—this attempts to ensure all children who board a school bus actually arrive at school and home as expected. However, situations do arise when some 'determined' students want to travel to friends or perhaps go to the shops and will not abide with the driver's instructions. In such situations drivers invariably radio our office to contact parents but this is not possible in all cases.

We are currently placing signage in all our school buses informing students that permission notes, signed by parent or carer, must be given to the driver if they want to leave the bus contrary to their usual set down or travel on different bus altogether. Eg. Medical, staying at friends, visiting grandparents etc.

"MY SPACE" PARENTING, TECHNOLOGY AND ADOLESCENTS

Parent Line counsellors often discuss with parents, their concerns about what their children are doing on line. Nearly 50% of Australian children access the internet after school and use it 2 - 6 days a week and 25% use it every day. On average children spend 7.9 hours per fortnight playing online games. (NSW Govt Factsheet "Game over! Knowing when to stop", 2009) So how can parents influence what their adolescent children are doing on line? Educate yourself about their on line activity. Join one of the social networking sites and see what really happens (it's might not be as scary as you think!), learn about the games they play, talk to others about technology. Be curious and interested when you talk to your children about technology and how what it means in their lives. Try to have the computer in a public space so that there is a transparency about their on line activity. Discuss the issues that concern you in a real way. Instead of being critical of technology, discuss what is concerning you about it (e.g. their safety, lack of sleep etc) Keep track of how your child is going in other areas of their life (school, interests, friends (not on line!), routines - e.g. eating, sleeping etc) and make an assessment about whether their on line activity is impacting these areas. If you are concerned or think that your child might be addicted to on line activity, contact a professional for help.
