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Ag QUIP Excursion

Our annual Great Western Tour was a great success again this year. A coach load of students enjoyed the three days away. While a day at Ag Quip field days is the focus of the tour we used the days either side to visit some very interesting places. These included the Ebor Trout Hatchery, UNE Sheep Farm, Tamworth Equine Centre and Killara Feedlot.

Our trip started on Tuesday with an early cold morning visit to the Dutton Trout Farm and Hatchery. Students learnt how trout are bred and hatched and then distributed to various rivers around Australia. Perhaps the highlight for many was the visit to the UNE sheep farm at Armidale. Our group was divided into four and sent to activity stations which included: drench and earmark sheep; classify sheep according to age; feet, wigging, wool; restrain sheep where students hog tied sheep ready for transport and; ram inspection where students had to inspect the ram's teeth, feet and testicles before they were sent out for the new breeding season. Seems girls were better at the last activity than the boys! We then went to the Tamworth Equine Centre where the Australian Reining Horse Championships were being held. We were lucky enough to have one of Australia's top reining horse trainers together with his champion horse give a personal demonstration and his trainer talked to us about training, workouts and competition. During the evening we also went to Ten Pin Bowling.

On Wednesday we spent a long day at Ag Quip walking through the displays we then went to the Gunnedah Rodeo that night. There were many spills and thrills in the bull ride and buckjump competitions. Thursday saw an early start as we travelled out to Killara Feedlot at Quirindi. A talk in the boardroom by the general manager was followed by a bus tour around the complex. The feedlot has a capacity of 20,000 head. Animal selection, nutrition, health and market requirements were discussed. After the feedlot we travelled back to Tamworth to watch the Reining Horse competition before heading back home. During our travels we were able to see the types of agriculture carried out in the Tamworth/Gunnedah area. The idea of the trip is to expose coastal students to more extensive western agriculture.

Parking of vehicles in and around school zones

Nambucca Shire Council have written to our school to remind parents and carers of the rules regarding parking of vehicles in and around school zones. Council Rangers patrol Shire roads and will issue Penalty Notices for parking infringements.

NO STOPPING - Vehicles must not stop in the area indicated. As soon as your vehicle stops in this area you commit and offence.

NO PARKING - Vehicles can be stopped to drop off or pick up passengers or goods. Two (2) minutes maximum if there is no time indicated on the sign. The driver is not allowed to leave the vehicle unattended - this is - be more than 3 metres from the vehicle during the time. BUS ZONE - Only a bus may stop in a bus zone to pick up or drop off passengers, or on a regular route. All other vehicles, including private vehicles, are not allowed to stop in a bus zone.

SCHOOL CROSSINGS - Do not stop on or near marked crossings unless giving way to pedestrians or in accordance with a traffic control operator.

TIME LIMITED AREAS - Obey the signage (ie time limited, rear to kerb, front to kerb, parallel or angled parking). At all other times park close and parallel to the left kerb in the correct direction of travel.

PENALTIES - Range from \$88 to \$353.

REMEMBER - Parking and speed limits restrictions have been placed in areas for the safety of all members of the community.

YEAR 9 ENRICHMENT PROGRAM

This term we have launched a program that allows a selection of Year 9 students to join the North Coast Gifted and Talented program focusing this term on Science. The students meet for two hours each week and communicate via the Edmodo - social education network and video conferencing. The program is focusing on an environmental element, looking at paper useage at schools and how we can improve recycling at school. The students have been selected because of their special interest in Science and have been participating diligently at all sessions.



ENERGY DRINKS

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Swampettes fall in Semi Final thriller

The mighty Under 15 Swampettes Rugby team have narrowly failed in their bid to go to the State Finals in Sydney for the second year in a row. It has been a disjointed campaign that has seen them play Wauchope in the 7 a side format, Westport in the 10 a side format and an absolute cracker of a game with Casino High in the 15 a side format; that decided the Northern Divisional Final, effectively the State Quarter final. All the girls have made great progress throughout the year, training week to week often without the prospect of a game. To retain their focus and spirit has been commendable to say the least. Lead by veteran Lydia Witte (a State Semi Finalist for the past three years) and ably supported by Maison Gainge and Shayna Welch. The young Swampettes forward pack have really stepped up. Props Maddison Mason, Kate Shaw and Tayla Fuller have been excellent in the trenches, as have Shenae Stewart and Jade Lowden, a revelation at flanker. Amber Nicholas, Ami Leigh French and Tegan McCann have been strong at the breakdown and have shown good skills and enthusiasm.

Newcomer Robin West has been so impressive in training that she assumed the dual leadership role and has lead from the front throughout the campaign, Nyomi Widders, Petrea Guiana and Nicole Welsh shared the halfback duties, provided great utility value and proved good links between forwards and backs. Sandi Grant McDonnell is another who has gone from strength to strength as has tackling dynamo Jess Kinsella and the ever reliable and now try scoring machine Maddison Price. It is in the outside backs where some newcomers to the team have shown great style and substance. Kelly Taylor, Nikki Davies and Jaiden Walker have been electric at times while late arrival Yeirah Dunn has also shown great promise. The girls have been involved in some great games in the lead up to the semis and have proven themselves to be proud Swampies and excellent ambassadors for the Valley and Macksville High.

Unfortunately for the girls the dream of a State Final was not to be. Travelling to Taree in atrocious weather the girls were in high spirits for the clash with Kirrawee High school. The game started with both teams buzzing with excitement. Early pressure from the Swampettes saw the game played in the opposition half and Maddison Price scoring the first try with bustling defence knocking the ball loose. Sustained pressure saw a penalty with Robin West bullocking over for a great solo try, converted by Sandi for a 12 nil lead in even time. From then on it seemed to be a war of attrition with both sides controlling possession and the play moving from end to end. We had a number of scoring chances that were shut down by scrambling defence or simple errors to go to the break still 12 up. The second half saw the opposition lift in intensity and control possession and field position. Kirrawee scored after 10 minutes of the half and then again with about five minutes to go to see the score 12 - 10. Our girls continued hitting in defence and counter attacking to force their way down field. With minutes to go we received a penalty in front which we converted for a 15-10 and seemingly match clinching lead. Unfortunately from the restart we tried to keep the ball in play rather than clearing it into touch. The Kirrawee girls forced a mistake, scooped up the ball and scored next to the posts for the equaliser. They coolly added the conversion for a 17 -15 victory. Although the Swampettes were shattered they congratulated their opponents on a fine victory. To all the girls and spectators I would like to say how proud I am of their efforts throughout the year. Thanks to Karliesha Roberts and Courtney Parkins for their assistance with coaching - great effort. We wish the Kirrawee girls all the best in the final and look forward to hopefully meeting them in the semis next year.
