NATIONAL DAY AGAINST BULLYING AND VIOLENCE



The Fifth National Day of Action against Bullying and Violence was held on Friday, 20 March 2015.

This year Macksville High School, along with more than 1950 schools, with more than 890,000 students across Australia participated by running local events. Students at Macksville High come together, unified to show their support and take a stand about bullying in their school, all students were wearing wristbands to promote zero tolerance. Students took time out of class to participate in group photos that will be a part of an exhibition promoting a collective rise against bullying in all schools.

This annual day provides a focus for all schools to say **Bullying**. **No Way!** and to strengthen their existing everyday messages that bullying and violence at school are not okay at any time.

Stage 4 students also created posters declaring their intolerance for any form of bullying and violence. They explored aspects of emotional, physical, verbal and cyber bullying. These posters will be displayed in the library and are indicative of the unified approach of Macksville High against bullying.

Parents, staff and students of Macksville High School continue to work together to create a school community that minimises bullying, harassment and violence.

2015 INTERNATIONAL COMPETITIONS AND ASSESSMENTS FOR SCHOOLS

Welcome to the 2015 International Competitions and Assessments for Schools (ICAS). For over 30 years, ICAS has taken place annually in schools throughout Australia, New Zealand, Singapore, Malaysia, Brunei, the Pacific region and South Africa. Your child is invited to participate in ICAS in 2015.

ICAS provides an opportunity for all students in Years 3 to 12 to gain a measure of their own achievement in an external testing situation. It provides teachers, parents and students with comprehensive reporting of results in the areas of Computer Skills, English, Mathematics, Science, Spelling and Writing.

All students receive a **certificate** and an **individual student report** indicating which questions they answered correctly and their score compared with the rest of the students tested. The tests are an excellent preparation for national tests and the student report is useful for highlighting your child's strengths and weaknesses. The certificate and individual student report are also suitable for your child to include in a portfolio.

Certificates are awarded for each year level as follows:

- · High Distinction to the top 1% of entrants
- Distinction to the next 10% of entrants
- · Credit to the next 25% of entrants
- Participation to all other participating students.

A UNSW medal is awarded when the highest score in each year level in each state in each subject is judged to be sufficiently meritorious. These medals are presented at either a UNSW Medal Ceremony or at a school assembly. Students must sit on the official sitting dates to be eligible for a UNSW medal.

D	Science - 3 June 2015 (\$8.80) (Years 7-12)
D	Writing — 15 June 2015 (\$18.70) (Years 7-12)

D	English - 28 July 2015 (\$8.80) (Years 7-12)
D	Mathematics - 11 August 2015 (\$8.80) (Years 7-12)

"Come now. Don't be shy. Step into the light."


Bilbo could feel that voice tugging at his chest and felt his legs involuntarily carrying him towards it until he managed to wrest control back.



JOB GOING AT MACKSVILLE HIGH?

Students in 9 M5 have been studying earning money, calculating wages and overtime, what to expect in the job interview process (e.g. when 900 people apply for 5 positions) etc. Often this can include dividing applicants into groups of 30, giving them a problem to solve while employers observe how the groups functioned.

I surprised my class with a mock interview recently. We are now studying the topic of measurement. I met the "applicants "at the door, greeted them at the door with a firm handshake and "thank you for applying for the position." I explained they had "applied" for a position as a labourer and would be asked to demonstrate their accuracy in measurement.

Students were divided into random groups and given instructions to measure a variety of objects inside and outside the classroom. They were marked on accuracy of their answers, ability to work well as part of a team, follow supervisors' instructions, act responsibly and respectfully on the "work site," and on their ability to complete "the job" and return equipment and results in a given time frame.


This exercise took students completely outside their comfort zone and initial resistance was high. The aim of the activity was to accustom students in working mathematically out of a normal routine. Supervisors Mrs Robertson and I supported students in the activity. At the end of the "interview" Logan Smolander was the applicant appointed to the "position." A well- deserved result Logan.

PYTHAGORAS' THEOREM PROVES TRUE!

Mathematics classes in Year 8 have been studying the topic of measurement, in particular we have studied the theorem Pythagoras discovered around 550BC. Early Egyptians also claimed to have discovered the result. The result relates to right angled triangles as follows

"In right angled triangles, the square on the hypotenuse is equal to the sum of the squares on the other two sides." (Source: New Signpost Maths Year Eight)



In Mrs Mendham's class students were divided into groups and were given the task of measuring the length and width of seven objects in the classroom. They calculated the length of the diagonal of each object using Pythagoras' Theorem and recorded their answers. They then measured the actual length of the diagonal and compared this to their calculated answer.

Results were compared and the group comprising Violet Capell, Charley Rumbel and Layne Rouse calculated 5 results out of 7 answers identical to the measured result! The group of Ethan Bullock, Amelia Telford and Trent Hawkes were equally consistent in their measuring with less than one percentage difference from the actual diagonal length. All students were engaged in measuring, recording and calculating answers and it was a pleasure to participate in a practical lesson with this great group.

SPORT AT MACKSVILLE HIGH

Macksville High runs an extensive sporting program for all participation levels. We have 21 knock-out teams playing in CHS (Combined High Schools) competitions ranging from Rugby Union (boys and girls), netball through to table tennis and lawn bowls. Our zone is the Lower North Coast (Nambucca High in the north through to Camden Haven High in the south). Our sporting area is the North Coast and it includes Tweed Heads in the north through to Camden Haven High.

As well as knock-out sporting teams we run carnivals in swimming, cross country and athletics. Most knock-out competitions are run in a gala day format to minimise the amount of time students have out of class. The swimming carnival is held early Term 1, the cross country is next Wednesday April 1 and athletics is in the middle of Term 2. Any students successful in these carnivals are invited to represent the school at zone level.

In school sport on Wednesday afternoons in Term 1 the Year 7 students do a small range of sports and rotate through these sports each week. In Terms 2 Year 7 will rotate through other games in house teams and play for points for their house. Term 3 they will chooses either netball, soccer, touch or teeball and then have an opportunity to represent the school in a gala day held in Kempsey late in Term 3. Term 4 Year 7 does swimming and is test for their water competency. All students need to be assessed before they can attend any water-based school activity.

Years 8 to 10 elected to do a range of sports which change each term. This term they had the choice of Archery, Basketball, Cattle Team, Carpet Bowls, Billiards, Fishing, Gold, Gym (Yrs 9/10 only), Hip Hop, Rugby Union (boys and girls), Soccer, Surfing, Swimming, Table Tennis, Tennis or Volleyball.

CAREERS NEWS: Term 1 Week 9

- 1. <u>Work Experience and Year 10</u>: by the time you read this ALL Year 10 should be completing their work experience at a HUGE range of workplaces around the Nambucca Valley (and beyond!). If you notice any, please check out how they are going!! Quite of number of them have been very ahead of themselves with planning- even completing a WHS Whitecard (so they are able to access building sites as part of the experience!!).
- 2. <u>Rural Universities</u>: there is a heap of activities coming up next term helping students gain a better understanding of what university study is like-
 - 01.05.15- University of New England Open day for Year 12
 - 07.05.15- Southern Cross UNIBound seminar with Year 8
 - 21.05.15- Careers EXPO at CHEC for Year 10
 - 12.06.15- Southern Cross UNIBound for Year 9
 - 25.06.15- University of Newcastle and Charles Sturt University Schools visit day for Year 12
 - (and Year 11's Post Schools Options Day at CHEC is on 22.07.15)

There is LOTS on- please make sure you keep your eyes open for the permission notes as they come around....

- 3. <u>USI</u>: stands for a Unique Student Identifier which is a combination of letters and numbers used to record the formal training that someone accesses. It is a bit like a Tax File Number (for tax and financial records) except it is for recording training purposes. All students will need one of these in the next 12 months, but they are easy to apply for- a process done online and requiring some checkable form of identification (Medicare card or Australian Birth Certificate being the most straight forward!). The link is found on the <u>www.macksvillehighcareers.com</u> site, looking under 'Post School Options' tab, then 'Smart and Skilled' then clicking on 'Unique Student Identifier'. The USI will stay with the student for life- only needs to be done once. If you have any trouble accessing this application, please feel free to call in to the Careers Office and we can go through this. While you are on the macksvillehighcareers.com site, check out what the students can achieve on our careers website and go in and 'like' the Facebook page so you will be updated every time something important is added!!
- 4. <u>Subject Selections</u>: this might sounds a bit silly but planning for 2016 is starting this next term!! As such, students need to be thinking about what they might want to achieve in 2016. While there is nothing specific to do organisationally now, just *having the conversation* is very appropriate- about subjects or interest, some goals being looked towards, researching courses/trainings post-school (trade, private or public providers), etc. It is also a good idea to contemplate whether any work placement activities could help with this. In Year 9 and 10 Careers class time we have been exploring a bit about what students might be interested in- both generically and specifically, trying to decide what might be of interest OR what might have career potential!!
- 5. <u>KEY- encourage your student to TAKE OWNERSHIP of what they are doing at School and push</u> them to seek assistance if it is needed!!

Teaching someone to drive can be a happy experience.
