The Lions Youth of the Year Club Final was held on 27 November at the Nambucca Hotel in Macksville. This program focuses on developing young people's interview skills and their public speaking skills. The two participants were Annalise Robertson and Blake Howle. Each student underwent a short interview at the Nambucca Shire Council Chambers where they were judged by a panel on their extra-curricular activities, sporting and cultural achievements. This interview also included a general knowledge section with three questions.



The challenging questions that the two students were asked to respond to were "What is APEC and what is their purpose?", "What are your thoughts on a change in prime-minister mid-term?" and "What would be the outcomes of decentralisation of government offices?".

After this interview, Annalise and Blake attended a dinner with the Lions club members at the Nambucca Hotel. The impromptu speeches were carried out before dinner and the two competitors had to respond to two questions involving sharks on the east coast of Australia and changing the age of prosecution for youth. After dinner Annalise presented her speech on the fascinating Platypus and the urgent need to protect their species. This speech was followed by Blake's speech where he discussed the qualities that sports such as Football teach people and the importance of sport. Both participants gave the competition their best and the judges said it was one of the closest and best competitions they had seen. Annalise was awarded the winning speech and the overall winner of the Lions Youth of the Year club final. # GIRLS ON FIRE



On 2 December 2018 I was lucky enough to be one of 20 young girls aged between 15 and 17 selected for the first ever Inaugural Girls Fire and Emergency Services Camp. The six-day camp was run to promote and increase numbers of women in the emergency services agencies by showing us that we can do whatever we like no matter what the stereotype. Firefighting is a job that is traditionally associated with men as 95% of the firefighting recruits are male. Firefighter Bronnie Mackintosh is the founder of the Girls on Fire Camp as she started the Girls on Fire group after examining how agencies in other countries encourage diversity within their ranks.

Throughout the week I was involved in numerous activities including theory and practical work with fire science, kitchen fire simulators, gas attacks, road crash rescue and trauma forum, cave maze rescue, flood boar rescue, community safety presentations and even team building activities such as, high and low ropes, abseiling, giant swing and a hike to an overnight campsite. During the week State Emergency Services (SES) and Rural Fire Service (RFS) volunteers along with NSW Fire and Rescue employees came to our camp at Yarramundi YMCA, to increase our knowledge of their roles and what they do. We met many young inspiring men and women and it helped increase our confidence and resilience and encouraged problem solving, teamwork and leadership.

Twenty young girls and myself were split into four platoons - red, yellow, green and blue. Within our platoons we worked as a team to come up with a team flag that would represent us throughout the week. On 7 December we had our graduation from the camp. At the graduation we had the RFS Commissioner Shane Fitsimmons and Fire and Rescue Commissioner Paul Baxter come to help present our certificates. Each participant received a graduation certificate after which I got up to deliver a speech on behalf of the team leaders and girls to thank everyone and to thank Bronnie. During the ceremony there was a surprise Leadership Award given out to a participant who showed the best leadership skills and team skills throughout the week. I was lucky enough to receive that award.

The Girls on Fire Camp was the best thing I have ever attended, I had made lifelong friends, been on the front page of the Sydney Morning Herald, experienced skills and activities I would not experience in my every day life and I have learnt things that will help me to be the best emergency service woman I can be.

## WHERE ARE THEY NOW?

While I was still at Macksville High I decided that I wanted to study law at university. After visiting and researching a lot of universities, I decided that I wanted to study at Bond University on the Gold Coast.

When I started university I wasn't completely sure what I wanted to do, but I knew I wanted to study a double degree in law and business. As I progressed through my degrees I learned more about

different areas of law and business, and this helped me decide on the career path that was right for me - I discovered that I had a passion for commercial law, and from there, I followed that passion.

I enjoyed my time at university immensely, and graduated from Bond University in 2017 with a Bachelor of Business (Marketing) and Bachelors of Laws with First Class Honours. I also graduated at the top of my cohort in my Business degree.

I was fortunate enough to have secured a number of legal clerkships while I was studying at University. Those clerkships allowed me to gain practical experience in the legal profession and gave me a better understanding of what it would be like to work in corporate law at a large commercial law firm. I was also fortunate to be given the opportunity to work as a paralegal for Virgin Australia at their head office in Brisbane. I worked at Virgin as a paralegal for just under a year and this helped me to decide that I wanted to pursue a career in commercial law at a top-tier law firm.



A year before I graduated from university I applied for graduate positions at a few law firms in Brisbane. I was fortunate enough to secure a position as a Graduate at Clayton Utz.

Clayton Utz is a top-tier law firm, with offices across Australia. I moved from the Gold Coast to Brisbane to start my graduate program, and I am now in the final stages of the graduate program at Clayton Utz. The graduate program at Clayton Utz has three six month rotations. So far, I

have spent six months working in Workplace Relations, Employment and Safety law, six months in Environment and Planning law, and now I am about to start my final six month rotation in Commercial Litigation.

In the year that I have been working full time I also completed post graduate study, which enabled me to become a fully qualified lawyer. I can now legally practice law in Queensland, and in the Federal Court. The journey to get to where I am now was incredible and I really encourage anyone thinking about tertiary education to give it a go and see how far it will take you.
