The assembly also provided an opportunity to screen a recent film production of Birrugan. This short film chronicles the life of local Gumbaynggirr hero ancestor Birrugan. The film was produced in association with the Saltwater Freshwater Alliance and features students from our school.



Dear Parents and Carers,

In 2020 we have developed an innovative program for Year 10 students. It is essential that students attend all school days as attendance is mandatory as outlined in the school attendance policy by Department of Education. https://education.nsw.gov.au/policy-library/policies/school-attendance-policy.

### The last day of the school year for Year 10 is Wednesday 16th December.

This program is focused on the development of skills that are essential for senior learning. The students will have the opportunity to participate in a variety of programs being offered by a range of experts. Each session is designed to provide fundamental learning skills to help students as they progress into Year 11 and 12.

Some sessions that will be offered in Week 9 have limited numbers so we encourage students to sign up quickly. Along with these expert sessions we will also be covering many mandatory aspects required by NESA. It is essential that students have completed all of these required sessions to ensure successful enrolment into Year 11 in 2021.

Students can sign up for the following sessions outside the Teaching and Learning Office:

- Apprenticeship Preparation Session
- Tax File and Unique Student Identity Number Application

Students will also attend sessions to obtain their NESA student numbers and enroll in the My Futures Workforce.

In Week 10 students will attend presentation assemblies where academic and sporting awards will be distributed.

### **Master Classes**

During Week 9 students will be provided with a wonderful opportunity to attend a 'Master Class' with their teachers for 2021 senior classes. These 'Master Classes' will provide a unique chance for students to gain an understanding about the expectations and course structure of each subject. They will also learn the fundamental skills that will be required for the course and be provided with information that will allow them to begin their preparation and organisation for the 2021 academic year.

In the Master Classes students will have the opportunity to ask questions about the course, gain additional information about the content and familiarise themselves with their peers and learning space. This will also be a valued opportunity for students to enquire about books, homework and preparation material to be gathered over the holidays.

# ROBOTICS

Robotics students started the term constructing bionic hands that have been 3D printed on one of Macksville High School's 3D printers. The hands are printed in biodegradable PLA. Fishing braid is threaded through channels to act at ligaments, dental elastics act as tendons. These hands will be donated to people with limb differences via the EN-able foundation. They are designed to work for people that have a wrist, but no fingers. The students take care to attach comfort padding to the gauntlet, which straps around the lower arm. The hand stump fits inside the palm, which students have also comfort padded. When the wrist is bent the fingers and thumb of the device close into a fist which can grasp water bottles or bicycle handles.

Students study the action of their own closing fist and then tension the ligaments to get just the right




# ART REPORT

# H S I E Show Me The Holidays

It was very pleasing to note those students who also considered the impact of a few thousand dollars on a community which had been impacted by bushfire or drought prior to COVID-19.

## Why I want to share my experiences

There have been few pivotal decisions in my life, but my choice to leave my Business degree for a Music degree genuinely changed my future. If sharing what I learned from choosing Music over Business can assist even one person's conflict or indecisiveness, then I'll be glad.

### **About me**

- Studying a Bachelor of Music (Honours) at University of Melbourne 2020-2021
- Acquired a Bachelor of Music at JMC Academy 2018-2020
- Relinquished a business scholarship & unenrolled in a Bachelor of Business to pursue music (2018)
- Travel a lot during my study breaks & holidays (international connections are important for a career in the arts!)

### My Experiences 'Business or Music'

Over 2016-2017 I took an interest in business and economics and I was convinced that this was a sensible path to follow. I won a scholarship to study business at La Trobe University in Melbourne and I moved into my student accommodation in Feb 2018. I gradually came to the realisation that I was simply meant to pursue music because, at that stage, I had already studied it for 9 years. I gave up my scholarship, dropped out, and immediately enrolled in a Bachelor of Music. Today I'm an Honours student at UniMelb preparing a research proposal for my Master's degree.

## What I learned from this experience

I found it tempting to pursue what was sensible rather than what I really wanted. I think this is a problem that everyone in the arts must confront - the argument of what will make money versus what you will enjoy. I learned that if you are passionate about something, you won't make excuses - you'll find a way to survive doing it and, eventually, thrive from doing it.

# **School Travel for 2021**

### 2021 school travel applications are now open

Applications for student travel in 2021 opened from Monday 12 October 2020.

Students who require a School Opal card or travel pass for 2021 can now apply online. A new application should be submitted if a student is applying for a school travel pass for the first time or

requesting an additional pass as a result of a new shared parental responsibility situation (e.g. joint custody).

Students who have changed school/campus, changed address, repeated a year or received an expiry notification from Transport for NSW for their school travel entitlement should re-apply or update their details.

\*Applications must be completed by the student's parent or legal guardian if the student is aged under 16 years. Students 16 years and over must complete the application form themselves.

Where there is a change of distance eligibility based on a student's grade, the system will automatically update a student's entitlement if they meet the new criteria. If they do not meet the new eligibility criteria, they will receive an expiry notification via email.

Students who have an entitlement approved under a medical condition which is due to expire will receive a notification advising them to re-apply.

Term Bus Pass holders will receive a notification to re-apply.

If a student needs to update their information or re-apply, they should go online to https://apps.transport. nsw.gov.au/ssts/updateDetails

Applications need to be submitted before **31 December 2020** to ensure that current student entitlements are updated and their current entitlement/card remains valid. If their application is submitted after 31 December 2020, the system will automatically cancel an entitlement/card and a new one will need to be issued.

Students in the Opal network applying for a SSTS or Term Bus Pass entitlement for the first time will receive their card at their nominated postal address. Cards will be mailed out from January 2021.

Students residing in Rural and Regional (R&R) areas should receive their travel pass at the commencement of the new school year from their nominated operator, this may be distributed via the school or sent direct to their address. Note: some R&R operators do not issue travel passes. Students/Parents should confirm with their nominated operator if they do not receive a pass.

### **New Concession Entitlement Cards**

Transport for NSW will be replacing the below cards with Transport Concession Entitlement Cards (TCEC) from October 2020:

Senior Secondary Student Concession Card (16 years and over) – also used by Mature Secondary Students (18 years and over), Distance Education Students and Home School Students, Proof of Age card (when a student under 16 years of age looks older) and Boarder Rail Pass. (All previous cards will be valid until they expire. Students who require a Transport Concession Entitlement Card should speak with their school administration staff).

The Squad acts under the governance of the Volunteer Rescue Association of N.S.W.

Members of the Squad are all volunteers. We are looking for people willing to take on Rescue roles (you will be trained). A number of ancillary staff positions also need filling.
